


# A Desperate Prayer From a Desperate Place

# Jonah 2:1-3

From inside the fish Jonah prayed to the LORD his God. <sup>2</sup> He said:

"In my distress I called to the LORD, and he answered me.

From deep in the realm of the dead I called for help, and you listened to my cry.


<sup>3</sup> You hurled me into the depths, into the very heart of the seas, and the currents swirled about me; all your waves and breakers swept over me.

## Jonah 2:4-6

<sup>4</sup> I said, 'I have been banished from your sight; yet I will look again toward your holy temple.' <sup>5</sup> The engulfing waters threatened me, the deep surrounded me; seaweed was wrapped around my head. <sup>6</sup> To the roots of the mountains I sank down; the earth beneath barred me in forever. But you, LORD my God, brought my life up from the pit.

## Jonah 2:7-10

- 7 "When my life was ebbing away, I remembered you, LORD, and my prayer rose to you, to your holy temple.
- 8 "Those who cling to worthless idols turn away from God's love for them.
- <sup>9</sup> But I, with shouts of grateful praise, will sacrifice to you.
- What I have vowed I will make good.
  - I will say, 'Salvation comes from the LORD.'"
- <sup>10</sup> And the LORD commanded the fish, and it vomited Jonah onto dry land.
